Coming into the final weeks of term, our teachers have been busy putting together our Mid-Year reports to keep you up to speed with how your child or children are travelling with their learning at the half-way point of the school year. For all the extra work it means for us as teachers, it's also a great opportunity to look back and see how far our students have come over the first semester, and to look forward to the steps to come next.

One important change in how we do reports this year, will be that they will be sent out through the TASS Parent Lounge which can be accessed through the MLS app. Doing reports this way will not only save on printing and paper, but will also make it easy to access your child's school reports anytime, anywhere, should you need them in the future. The plan is for reports to go out in Week 9.

Being the first time sending out reports in this way, we have to expect a few teething problems. If we hit hurdles that can't be cleared by the end of term, don't panic. Likewise, if you have trouble accessing your child's report through the app, and need a paper version, that also can be sent out at the beginning of Term 3.

BUS SAFETY IS EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY

The tragic bus accident in NSW last weekend serves as a timely reminder for us all that bus safety should not be taken for granted.

With this incident fresh in our minds, it is an opportune time to revisit the issue of bus safety.

Our school bus passengers have an important role in helping to ensure their own safety. They can help in two simple and practical ways. Firstly, by sitting correctly with their seat belt fastened, they are reducing the risk of serious injury if there is an incident. Secondly, by refraining from any type of behaviour that might cause distraction to the driver, they are reducing the risk of any incident occurring in the first place.

If your children are users of one of our school buses, we ask that you talk about this with them. Two simple points to raise: SEATBELTS and BEHAVIOUR. With everyone's help, we will do our bit to get them to school in the morning, and home again in the afternoon, safely.

TEACHER INSTALLATION SERVICE



MEET OUR EXCHANGE STUDENT

Chloé arrived in Australia on May 28 and is here for a 12 week exchange through Student Exchange Australia & New Zealand, staying with the Wegener Family. She lives near Grenoble in France and enjoys playing tennis, scuba diving and skiing.

We asked Chloé a few questions to see what differences she has found since arriving.

- There are a lot of differences between our schools. The subjects are different. We don't practice cooking or do research projects. In France we eat in a cafeteria or canteen. We don't have a lunchbox. Our school day starts at 8.30am and ends at 5pm. We also don't wear a uniform. We have 1000 students at our school.
- I live near a big city so there are a lot of differences to Maitland. Everyone knows each other here, in my city that wouldn't be possible. The landscape here is very desert with a lot of fields and in France our towns are closer than in Australia.
- I am really desperate to see a Kangaroo or Koala while I am here.
- I really wanted to learn another sport like Netball while I was here which I got to try last night.
- I really wanted to come to Australia because it is necessary for my future job to speak English very well. My sister has been in Canada for 1 year and she encouraged me to come here as she has had a great exchange experience.
- In Australia, there are many foods that we don't have in France, like Vegemite or snack like recess foods. I really like the food in Australia but I don't like Vegemite. I do like Tim Tams.
- I would like to teleport our French breads (baguettes) or the patisserie and haribo's candy to Australia.
- In France, the relationship between students and teachers is much less friendly than here. I find that really cool but at first it made me feel weird.

Please give Chloé a big welcome if you see her around the place. We are glad to have you here with us at MLS
