STAGE 1 OUTDOOR EDUCATION - KAYAKING


On Wednesday the 25th of October to Friday the 27th of October we had our final Outdoor Education camp of the year. We attended Murraylands Aquatics Centre where students were taught the basic skills of kayaking. These skills included different paddling techniques, capsizes and rescues.

On the first day students were thrown in the deep end and started off their kayaking experience with capsizes and rescues. Students all took turns in capsizing their kayaks & rescuing each other. When we returned to our camp students warmed up with a quick shower before having to choose & set up their campsite & organise their dinner.

During this camp students were required to plan & organse their own meals over the 3 days. Breakfasts consisted of cereal and hot drinks. Lunch was predominantly wraps or crackers. For dinner there was a mixture of meals consisting of yiros, burgers, stir fries, wraps & risotto.

On the second day we were blessed with sunny, warm weather which was perfect for our distance paddle. As a group we kayaked 3km from White Sands back to Murraylands Aquatic Centre. Students took turns in leading the group & being front & back markers to ensure we stayed together as a group.

On the last day, the class was lucky enough to be able to choose an additional activity where students choose to have a go at kneeboarding before having to pack up & return home.

THAI SAUSAGE ROLLS

Ingredients

1 slice white bread 175g chicken mince ¼ onion 1 T sweet chili sauce 1 tspn fish sauce 1 tspn brown sugar 2 sheets puff pastry 1 egg beaten Chicken salt



Method

Preheat oven to 220 C

Place bread into a medium bowl. Pour over warm water to just cover. Stand for 5 mins and drain. Squeeze bread to extract water.

Place bread into a large bowl. Add mince, onions, chili and fish sauce and sugar. Stir until well combined. Place a sheet of puff pastry on a flat surface and cut in half.

With damp hands mould the mince mixture and roll down the edge and use the beaten egg to glue the edge, using a pastry brush and on top and season with chicken salt.

Cut each section into 4 even pieces and place on tray lined with baking paper.

Bake for 15 to 20 mins or until golden brown.

What is Play Therapy?

Play is the natural language of children and toys are their words.

Child Centred Play Therapy is a humanistic/relationship-based approach, working therapeutically with children using the child's preferred communication.

Play Therapy is an intervention approach for children aged 2-12. Older children may be considered.

The Play Therapy model used is Child Centred Play Therapy, meaning that during our sessions the child is in complete control of the play.

Children may not have the verbal Knowledge and emotional regulation to express their feelings through words but they can 'play out' those feelings.

What areas of difficulty can Play Therapy support?

• Trauma

- Aggressive and Oppositional Behaviours
- Behaviours
 Speech and Language Delays
 Attachment
 Anxiety
 ASD
 Developmental Delays
 Social Difficulties

- Grief and Loss
